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Jim Morris May 21, 1947 - August 23, 1923

Former Local Hunt Test Judge, Master National judge and longtime retriever handler, and while there was exposed to Agent Jim Morris died in Gresham, Oregon on August Orange. He was a painter by trade. 23, 2023. Jim was 76 years old.

Jim started running, judging, and training dogs at NAHRA events in 1985. He had a big male lab named Barny and the two were described as two peas in a pod. In addition to being a handler, Jim often worked at any event he attended. He judged all levels at the weekend tests as well. Jim served as a Master National judge in 1997 and 2003.



In 2014, Jim was honored by the Pacific Northwest Retriever Clubs (Greater Pacific, Redwood Empire, Marin, Salem, PSLRA, Oregon HRC, Oregon RTC, Lassen, RHRC, Rose City, Rogue Valley, Umpquah Valley, Sierra Nevada and Tallahassee HRC) for his service to our Hunt Test Sport.

Jim served in the U.S. Army in Viet Nam



Jim often got talked into playing Santa at the local clubs while taking photos of handlers and their dogs.

He is famous for his wooden bench that went everywhere with him and was made by his daughter Jenny. He never failed to have a kind word for anyone, a love for the dogs and the sport, and a devoted following of friends who will miss him terribly.

Five Ways to Prepare your Duck Dog for Fall

One of my favorite professional dog trainers is fond of the expression, "Champions are made in July." Although he's referring to field trial dogs, the sentiment speaks to the impact that summertime training and exercise can have on a retriever's performance in the fall. The time to prepare is now. Here are five ways to ensure your duck dog is ready

Tune Up Obedience

The three most basic commands — sit, stay and come — lay the groundwork for all obedience to come. A steady dog must first learn to stay, a Lab has to sit to accept hand signals, and the "come" command is prerequisite to retrieving. Revisit these commands

frequently this summer, as allowing fundamentals to slip will almost certainly degrade more advanced training. Retriever-specific basics such as steadiness and the "place" command should also be reviewed, particularly if your dog's obedience waivered midseason. Command refusals won't resolve themselves.

"Winterize" Your Dog's Coat

Retrievers repel water, wind and icy temperatures by employing a double-coat and natural oils. Therefore it's wise to avoid bathing your duck dog as summer winds down, lest you remove its protective oils. And, if your dog lives in the house, try to limit your use of artificial light starting in mid-August. Your retriever's thick, winter coat grows in response to shortening days, not cooler temperatures. Indoor lighting can impede this process.

Drill, Drill, Drill

Summer is a challenging time to train, but train you must, at least if you want your retriever to improve or even simply avoid regressing. First, honestly assess your retriever's progress. Is he ready to mark multiple falls, or has he gotten sloppy with singles? Is it time for full-fledged blind retrieves, or do you need to further iron out his casts and lining? Plan a consistent summer regimen, allowing the dog's progression to dictate the pace of adding new drills, and you'll be a happy guy in October. Keep the sessions short and have plenty of water available.

Maintain a Healthy Weight

If you do nothing else this summer, don't commit the sin of allowing your duck dog to get fat. In addition to long -term health risks, an overweight retriever won't fare well the next time a winged mallard settles midriver. It's an easy trap to fall into, but in the off-season, your dog's activity level is

likely much lower. He isn't burning calories just to stay warm, so reduce his food accordingly, by 25 or even 50 percent. Be sure to monitor the dog's weight and body composition for signs you need to further adjust food intake.

Keep Him Fit

You can also help maintain your dog's weight while achieving cardiovascular fitness through safe summer exercise. Water work is the preferred choice, as it provides a fun, efficient, full-body workout for the heart, lungs and muscles. It's regarded as the safest form of summer exercise, too. But be careful: Dogs can still overheat in water, particularly shallower water on hot days. By tossing bumpers into a pond or lake for your retriever this summer, you'll enable him to focus on the next volley of birds — rather than catching his breath — later this fall.

Old/New Business

Master National Voting: Voting on the first proposal (Qualifier Model) is due August 10. As determined at the last meeting, RHRC will be voting as follows: Qualifier Model – No; Regional Nationals – No; 6 of 8 Model – Yes. These votes reflect feedback the board has received from RHRC members.

Hunt Test Job Descriptions: This is a work in progress. Several people are collaborating on the development of these job descriptions. On August 18 the Tri-Club members will be meeting to work on the documents. We will have accurate and clear job descriptions to begin the 2024 Hunt Test Season.

Hunt Test – August 12/13, 2023

Equipment Trailer: We will need someone to move the Equipment Trailer closer to Headquarters on Friday, August 11. It will be moved by someone on site who has the appropriate trailer hitch.

<u>Burlap Bags:</u> Still need confirmation on the procurement of the Burlap Bags for the Hunt Test.

<u>Bird order:</u> Lee will be confirming the arrival of the birds on August 2.

Workers: Still short. We must meet the age requirement (16 y/o) for those who work a Pop and Throw station. This is an issue of liability with our insurance (Equisure).

<u>Gunners:</u> Bill Woll reports that there are plenty of gunners available. (Boyd Ulsh/Pete Szilare; Don West/Scott Corley/Bill Woll)

Marshal: Still need test dogs for Junior and Master. Susan will run Keeper as junior TD.

<u>Stake Chair:</u> Misalyn is Stake Chair for Master. Workers are still needed.

<u>Lunches:</u> Prepared by Holly Krohn and Julie Chakin

<u>Judges Gifts/Dinner:</u> Gifts by Lee Redd are done; dinner will consist of pizza and salad, dessert, drinks

<u>Event Catalogs:</u> 70 have been ordered from Hunt Test Secretary.

<u>Event Sign:</u> We need a new Event sign to be displayed at the entrance to the test site. Betsy will get letters to put on the folding board.

Sanitary Facilities: Provided by Will Hart

Food Truck/Raffle

Bill has arranged for the food truck to be on the grounds on Saturday at 3 PM. We have many desirable items for the Raffle. High value items will be a Pheasant Hunt, entries to 3 Hunt Tests, a Dummy Launcher and more. RHRC Board Meeting Minutes September 5, 2023

President Betsy called the meeting to order at 6:31 PM. The August 2, 2023 minutes were approved as written.

Treasurer's Report, Lee Redd: Lee provided an overview of the finances from our spring and fall hunt tests. The spring test cost nearly \$!2,000 while the fall test was a little over \$9,000. The expensive spring item was the birds (last minute pheasants vs ducks). Major differences were reflected in cost of the judges. We paid a lot for our spring judges (nearly \$2,000 for travel/food) vs \$500 for the fall judges. Overall, we only lost \$562 between the two tests. The fall raffle raised \$1450 so that helped a lot. The cash balance for RHRC is \$14,606. Lee urged everyone to set up Zelle for easier money transfer.

Old/New Business -

Fall Hunt Test Debrief – Board members discussed the August 12/13 hunt test. Kudos were given to Chris Braswell for her ATV assistance. She made everything much easier. Birds were at all stakes appropriately and she also assisted with equipment when it was needed. Lee recommends an "Equipment Czar" who will be at the equipment trailer and make sure that sufficient and appropriate equipment is out at all stakes. We also realized that when a club member is judging, they should not be responsible for any of the mechanics of the overall event. Brad Henman was an excellent supplier for our ducks. He was very helpful and conscientious. The Food Truck was not as popular as we had hoped. In addition to the late arrival of the food

truck, hunt test participants had brought their own food, so they did not patronize the food truck. We will reevaluate it for our next event.

Equipment Trailer – Betsy asked for volunteers to move the trailer to Nancy Light's property. A discussion was held regarding leaving the trailer at SVRG over the winter. Lee is going to ask Will Hart if he would store the trailer for \$300/year. This would be a Tri-Club expense. The security of the trailer at SVRG over the winter was discussed. No decision was made.

Training Days – the Board decided to hold training days on the third Saturday of the month beginning February 2024. Location TBD but probably Cherry Valley. We will need birds for the training days. Nancy Light has the Tri Club freezer at her place for storing the birds.

Shotgun Buy Back – Betsy has all the shotguns stored in a gun safe at her home. There are 8 good ones and 13 that no longer are usable. She will take them to a Buy Back location as soon as one comes up in Snohomish County.

<u>Holding Blinds</u> – There are 2 blinds that need repair. Susan Bell will repair them.

Master Amateur Invitational (June 9-16) — Will be held at SVRG and perhaps Cherry Valley. Several people are helping with logistics including Colin Ching, Gary Abbot and Bill Woll. Colin and Gary are helping locate private grounds for pre national training. A discussion was held regarding food for judges/workers. All of this is still in the planning stage. Jean assisted Julie Cairns in locating a place for the Handlers Banquet. It will be at the Snohomish County Fairgrounds in Monroe.

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RHRC Board Meeting Minutes September 5, 2023



<u>Scratch Policy</u> – a discussion was held regarding our hunt test scratch policy. No changes were made to the current policy.

<u>Chase Away Cancer</u> – The board discussed how to acknowledge member's dogs that had crossed the rainbow bridge. Lee proposed one large donation at the end of the year in memory of all the dogs who had died. No decision was made.

New Members – the Board welcomed Brian and Tricia Townley who live in Carnation and have Chessies.

<u>Master National 6 of 8 Proposal</u> – This proposal failed to garner enough support by member clubs.

All three proposals have failed.

Judge Seminar – Doug Gallucci reported on the information he secured from AKC for RHRC to hold a Judge Seminar in the spring. It will cost \$500 for the first 20 participants and then \$25 for each additional participant. RHRC needs to give AKC 3 proposed dates, 3 months in advance of the seminar. There may be grants available to help defray the cost of the seminar.

Betsy adjourned the meeting at 7:54 PM

AKC Regulations Change

We have received the following communication from AKC:

"This is to inform your club of a change to the Regulations & Guidelines for AKC Hunting Tests for Retrievers. This <u>change</u> is effective August 1, 2023. This change allows handlers in the

junior test level to speak quietly to their dog and pet their dog for reassurance anytime during the junior test level. This is intended to be encouraging to new handlers and new dogs and to help them gain confidence at this beginner level. This will only be allowed at the junior level.

The exact wording of this change is underlined and in bold and will appear in the next printing of the regulations as follows:

Chapter 4. Standards for Junior, Senior and Master Hunting Tests, Section 6. (3rd paragraph) The handler of the working dog shall remain silent from the time handler signals for the first bird to be thrown until the Judges release the dog. Except handlers in the junior test level at anytime may speak quietly to their dog and be allowed to touch their dog for reassurance or positioning.


