Senior Citizen Care—by Tom Keer,

Everybody loves puppies, but older dogs love everybody. Gun dogs are tough and are experts at concealing aches and pains. A little extra care is required to keep them hunting/competing and it's well worth it.

Weekly, if not daily, work helps keep senior gun dogs in good-to-great shape. However, ultimately, Father Time catches up with us all, and Dr. Johnny Myers, owner of the Animal Wellness Center in Paducha, KY routinely sees three common characteristics in senior dogs:

A Slower Metabolism.

"Any animal will experience a slowing of the metabolism with age. There isn't a precise, scientifically proven time of when that happens, and that metabolic slowdown can vary by breed as well as individual dog. Symptoms can include graying hair, memory loss, loss of energy, weight gain, among others. If I had to pick a time to start looking for adult dogs to transition

to their senior life, I'd look sometime around the dog's seventh year."

Recovery Times Take Longer. "Senior dogs make the first few days of hunting look easy but after that they'll need more recovery time. A side effect of exercise is the formation of free radicals and a buildup of lactic acid. Senior dogs will need more rest in between hunts than younger dogs. That might translate into a day off of every two or three days on."

Cruciate Ligament Issues. "Older age always brings injuries that happened in the past to the

surface. Years of running and hunting puts a lot of pressure on a dog's joints. Ligaments as well as tendons wear out over time. Keep your older dog's time on the ground short and on less aggressive terrain."

Senior Nutrition. "It's really easy for older dogs to gain weight. They are burning fewer calories and weight gain can happen if they are fed the same amount that they had when they were working hard. Consider a food with a lower protein/fat blend unless they have decided to eat

less than usual, in which case stay on the higher protein/fat formula."

Russ Kelley, Eukanuba's Scientific Services
Nutritionist, breaks down the senior age into three different groups. Group 1: 7—8 years old; Group 2: 9—10 years old and Group 3: over 10 years old. Feed the best nutrition you can afford and keep an eye on the following:



Beat the Heat. "Watch for signs of heatrelated illness, keep properly hydrated. Cold weather and water exaggerates any soreness or pain especially in joints."

Rest and Reduce Inflammation. "Diets that contain omega-3, EPA, and glucosamine help reduce work-related inflammation."

Oxidative Stress. Recovery time can be improved if the diet contains antioxidants. Nutrients that can reduce oxidative stress include

Vitamin E, Vitamin C, lutein, beta-carotene, and taurine. Be sure your dog's food contains antioxidants as it will help them heal.

Tendons and Ligaments. "Diets containing glucosamine and chondroitin have been shown to have a positive and direct impact on improving joint health. Glucosamine regulates collagen synthesis, which is the process that supports strength and flexibility of connective tissue. Chondroitin inhibits the production of destructive enzymes that break down connective tissue. Diets that contain glucosamine can help improve the connective tissue's health, while diets with chondroitin help prevent enzymes from having a negative impact."

Increase Vet Visits. With older dogs, it's a good idea to increase vet visits to twice a year...Before the hunting or testing season begins and again after that season is over.

As our dogs age, our expectations need to change accordingly. Helping them stay fit, adjusting their pace and ensuring that they are getting the proper nutrients will keep them hunting and competing for as long as possible. That goes for owners and handlers too!




